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ENGLISH 'OTHELLO' TRIP, 25TH NOVEMBER

On the 25th November, a small group of year 12 and 13 English students were selected to attend a series of lectures with Ms Gilling about 'Othello', designed to help strengthen their understanding of the play and prepare them for their A levels. The conference, at the Bloomsbury Central Baptist Church, consisted of 4 speakers approaching the play with different interpretations and aspects to give the students revision techniques and useful exam strategies to help them with their studies.

These sessions gave students from several schools an insight into different interpretations of the play and were taught by professors and critics, such as Richard Marriott and Dr Pamela Mason who gave their own unique views and beliefs of Othello, and letting other student give their own opinions as well. I believe that this particular conference was a brilliant experience for pupils to understand this play in a new perspective, such as the roles of characters and different, feminist approaches to the overall plot. As it was a lecture, it also would give A Level student the authentic experience of a university lecture. I would definitely recommend this opportunity for any Sixth Form English Literature student who is studying Othello, as well as the current GCSE students who are interested in doing this subject in the future.
