St Gregory's Young Musicians Perform on London Stage

Twenty of our most talented young musicians recently had the opportunity to perform at Cadogan Hall in London with professionals from the Royal Philharmonic Orchestra (RPO).

This was the culmination of a project delivered by the RPO's educational team (RPO Resound) to engage young people in listening to and performing orchestral music.

Following a series of workshops led by composer, Charlotte Harding, St Gregory's pupils collaborated with the RPO and Isata Kanneh-Mason (pianist and Artist in Residence) to compose a brand new piece of music themed around stars. The inspiration for this new work was a book written by Isata's sister.

Under Charlotte's guidance, pupils developed rhythms, melodies, harmonies, motifs and lyrics which Charlotte stitched together seamlessly into a new work, called Celeste. The piece was then orchestrated and on 3rd May, St Gregory's young musicians joined Isata and the full Orchestra onstage at Cadogan Hall to give an outstanding world premiere performance.

I would like to congratulate all pupils involved for engaging with passion and enthusiasm in this amazing project. Eco Committee Update

Active Travel Week

This term, the Eco Committee has embraced the TfL STARS Challenge—Transport for London’s accreditation scheme for schools.

Sustainable **T**ravel, **A**ctive, **R**esponsible, **S**afe.

The STARS Challenge empowers young people to make a positive impact on travel in their school and local community, inspiring them to think differently about travel and its impact on health, well-being and the environment.

We have delivered assemblies to pupils in Years 7 & 8 giving travel tips to help them stay safe when travelling on buses and tube trains. We have delivered a PSHE lesson on road safety and conducted an obstacle course in a Year 7 PE lesson showing the need to concentrate fully when walking near busy roads.

At the beginning of this term, we conducted a hands-up survey with every class in the school to identify their actual mode of travel to school versus their preferred mode of travel to school. These were our findings:

| Mode of Travel | Actual | Preferred |
|---------------------------------|--------|-----------|
| Active travel (walking/cycling) | 13% | 35% |
| Public Transport | 68% | 35% |
| Car | 19% | 30% |

We aim to increase active travel by encouraging pupils to walk or cycle; to “drop a stop” (get off the bus one stop earlier and walk the rest of the way) or “park and stride” (parents park away from school and children walk the rest of the way).

From 12th—16th June we will be running Active Travel Week. There will be a number of prizes for pupils walking and cycling to school, the details of which will be outlined in a PSHE lesson on 9th June. Please encourage your child/ren to take part and help us to reduce congestion around our school, helping to keep us safer and healthier as well as reduce pollution.

Cycle Training for Year 7

On 11th and 12th July, pupils in Year 7 will have the opportunity to undertake cycle training and achieve their Bikeability Awards. The training will be delivered by Brent’s partners Cycling Instructor UK. Pupils must have a bicycle in full working order and must attend both days of training. Places on this programme are limited and will be allocated on a first come, first served basis. Letters/application forms will be circulated to parents/carers after half term.

Upcycling Competition

To round off our Sustainability Month Activities, over the Easter holidays we asked pupils to create something useful or decorative out of materials they would otherwise have thrown away. Pupils brought their creations into school after the Easter break and the entries were judged by the Eco Committee. There were some fantastic creations, including a guitar made out of cardboard; pen holders made out of old tin cans; a purse made out of an old pair of denim jeans and a wallet made from a tetra pack carton. The winning entry was created by Meagan Fernandes 6WOC, who turned a plastic bag into spun fibres with which she crocheted a necklace and earrings. Inspired!

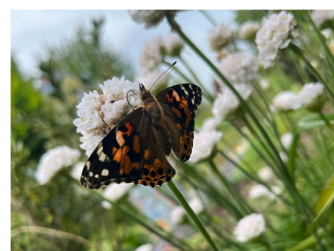

During this half term pupils (and staff) have watched the progress of caterpillars during their journey to becoming 'Painted Lady' butterflies. The Year 12 biologists separated the caterpillars into containers and gave them the nutrients they needed to grow and form cocoons. Year 9 scientists then transplanted the cocoons (Chrysalides) into their hatching habitat and we watched in awe as they emerged as beautifully transformed butterflies. After watching them feed and strengthen their wings we released them into the Eco Garden to enjoy the time they have left.
