Sports Day was a huge success in all respects. Although very competitive, it was a day filled with fun and laughter and pupils thoroughly enjoyed the day. Congratulations to Benedict House who were the overall winners on the day. My thanks, also, to Mr Francis and the P.E. Department for the superb organisation of the day.

We are delighted that our work as part of the DfE Behaviour hubs programme has continued to grow. We have hosted 3 excellent Open Days for 7 schools. Following these Open Days, we have had extremely positive feedback from our visitors in respect of the fantastic behaviour of our children. We were also extremely pleased to receive a National School Attendance Award from the Fisher Family Trust organisation, placing us in the top 25% of schools in the country for the attendance levels of our students. As you are probably aware from reports in the media, pupil attendance levels in schools across the country have not returned to pre-pandemic levels. So it is very pleasing to see that this has not been an issue for St Gregory's, especially in light of the impact that poor attendance has on examination results.

Other successes this term have included the Year 11 and Year 13 proms, the Art exhibition of Year 11 and Year 13 work, the return of our Annual International Evening with entertainment and food from many countries around the world, and the excellent contribution our Parents' Forum makes to the life of the school.


Equality, Diversity, Inclusion (EDI) Club

Careers Department Update

We would like to thank all the employers and volunteers who have made the following activities possible.

Year 10 Mock Interviews: During the spring term, Year 10 students were busy writing their CVs ready for their mock interviews at the beginning of the summer term. A number of employers came into school to conduct the interviews and every Year 10 student was able to take part in a one-to-one interview. As well as being interviewed, students were able to ask the employer questions about their job and discover the career path that led them to where they are today. The students said they found the experience very inspiring.

Careers Fair: On May 5th students in years 8, 9, 11 and 12 visited our Careers Fair held in the hall. Visiting employers represented careers in construction, engineering, retail, police and the voluntary sector. The students listened to a short talk from the employers and were then able to ask questions. Feedback from students, staff and employers was very positive.

Year 10 Enterprise Day: On June 30th our Year 10 students took part in an Enterprise Day, "Invention, Invention", which was run by a group of the school's business partners. This activity was designed to help students use their thinking, team working, presentation and enterprise skills to devise a device/gadget which could benefit the lifestyles of others and to learn the importance of innovation and invention.

In order to be successful and complete the tasks, the students needed to work as a team, using their communication, time management and decision making skills. It was evident that all the teams were thinking about energy saving, using recycled and recyclable materials and the cost to the environment.

Each form group sent one team to the final, where each team presented their product and marketing plan to a panel of judges. The winning team was "Tempo" from 10L who designed a water bottle which would heat or cool the contents to any temperature from 0° to 100°C. They were presented with vouchers.

Well done to all of our Year 10 students and congratulations to the winning team from 10L.



Year 12 Work Experience: During the last full week of term, Year 12 students undertook a work experience placement. Some students found their own placements, while others were provided by the school and our business partners.


$Basketball\ Triumph$

During this period, the number of Key Stage 3 pupils travelling actively increased from 14% to 19%. Active Travel is a good form of exercise; it improves cognitive ability and is better for the environment. London Transport Museum. In July, ten Year 7 pupils undertook the Bikeability cycle training course. Over two days, they improved their cycling skills making them more confident cyclists.
