From the Headteacher

This has, I believe, been another excellent term for our school. We returned to the wonderful news in September that our GCSE and A-Level students had, yet again, despite the impact of the pandemic, achieved fantastic examinations results.

Our GCSE results placed us in the top 5% of schools nationally for our attainment 8 score and we were, as you can imagine, delighted that almost 33% of our grades were at grade 7 to 9 (equivalent to the old A* or A grade - the national average was 23%).

In the Sixth Form, 33% of our passes were at grades A* and A, 72% of our passes were at grades A*- B and 95% of our passes were at grades A*- C. Moreover, over 40% of our vocational grades were at Distinction star or Distinction (which is equivalent to an A* or A at A Level). As a consequence of these outstanding results, we have been ranked by ALPs in the top 1% of schools and Sixth Form colleges nationally.

Yet despite all of these fantastic results, the school has not sat back and relaxed. We have continued with our superbly attended revision classes for upper school students (held after school and on Saturday mornings).

There was a huge turn out by prospective parents at our open evening in September; we had a superb prize night in November and, as ever, our school has been highly generous in its support for deserving charities.

In addition, I am delighted that work on our two new teaching blocks is progressing well and that they are on schedule to open early next term.

For all this I am extremely grateful and I would like to thank, as this term draws to a close, the governors of the school, my dedicated and hardworking staff, and our parents and families for the support they give to the school.

I would also like to take this opportunity to say good luck and thank you to Mrs McCafferty, Mrs Choudhury, Mrs Morrison, Mr Breakspear and Mrs McConnell who are leaving the school at the end of this term; and I would also like to send best wishes to Miss Lehane who begins her maternity leave in January.

At this time of year it is clear to me that we have much to be thankful for in our lives. However, as we enter the final week of term and prepare for our Advent Carol service and final assemblies, I would urge all of us at St Gregory's to remember what a special time the Christmas period is in our liturgical calendar and I hope that St Gregory's students are able to attend Christmas liturgies as a member of their parish community.

Finally, on behalf of the governors and staff at St Gregory's I would like to wish a Happy and Peaceful Christmas to our pupils and their families.

Catholic Social Teaching

This year at St Gregory's, in line with the teaching of Pope Francis, we are focussing on promoting Catholic Social Teaching (CST). CST is rooted in Scripture, formed by the wisdom of Church leaders, and influenced by grassroots movements. It is our moral compass, guiding us on how to live out our faith in the world. As part of CST, we share with our pupils the importance of serving others and promoting social justice. By engaging in acts of service and advocating for those in need, our pupils develop a sense of worth; understanding their ability to make a positive impact on the world. We recognise that our faith calls us to love God and to love our neighbours in every situation, especially those living in poverty.



Each pupil at St Gregory's has a critical role to play in our school to uphold our faith and social justice. As a community at Gregory's we are activists for social change, which has been advocated by Pope Francis as he invites us all to be Missionary Disciples of Christ. Following in the footsteps of Christ, we hope to make present the justice, love and peace of God in our unjust and broken world.

Last half term, the principle of CST on which we focused was Care of God's Creation: As Christians, we are called to be good stewards of creation. That means we are meant to look after the world that God created for us and to work to leave it in a better condition for the people who come after us.

'Creation is a gift, it is a wonderful gift that God has given us, so that we care for it and we use it for the benefit of all.' Pope Francis, Laudato Si.

This half term we have focussed on Solidarity and Peace: In November we remembered, as a nation, those who have died in conflict. Throughout the rest of the half term we have been particularly mindful of the need for peace in the world. We continue to remember those who have died in wars and pray for resolutions to current conflicts. *Mrs Briody, Head of R.E.*

In addition, staff have donated and delivered Christmas food hampers to a number of St Gregory's families. We would like to thank:



Travelling to School

In December the Year 8 Travel Ambassadors presented assemblies to pupils in Years 7-10 about the impacts of air pollution and ways in which we can improve air quality. One way in which we can help to improve air quality is to use more active forms of transport, minimizing journeys using polluting vehicles. The Travel Ambassadors declared Friday 8th December as St Gregory's Clean Air day, asking pupils to walk or cycle to school; to get off the bus a stop earlier and walk the rest of the way and to try not to travel to school in the car. In support of Clean Air day, form groups created a clean air pledge board stating what actions each pupil will take to help improve air quality.

The Travel Ambassadors also conducted a Science experiment in the roads around the school and found significant evidence of Nitrogen loving lichens and tar spots on trees along the roads around the school. These factors indicate pollution from vehicles.
