Leading the Way in Behaviour

As we approach the half term break, I am delighted to announce that we shall imminently be taking possession, from the building contractors, the temporary classrooms, which have been constructed at pace in Woodcock Park adjacent to the school. The new buildings are fully integrated with the school IT and CCTV systems; contain their own toilet block and are incorporated within boundary fencing which has been extended from the main school. These classrooms will house our Art and MFL departments which have been displaced due to the discovery of RAAC in a small area of the main school building. I would like to take this opportunity to thank my dedicated and resourceful staff in these two departments who have gone above and beyond to ensure uninterrupted curriculum delivery to pupils. We are all excited to be moving into our new space soon after half term.

On 31st January representatives from the Department for Education visited St Gregory's to gain feedback on the national Lead Behaviour Schools programme, of which St Gregory's has been an exemplar of best practice. During the three years this programme has been in place, St Gregory's has mentored 14 schools, receiving visitors from these and other schools on a regular basis. The leaders of the DfE's behaviour programme said they were impressed not only by the behaviour of our pupils but also by the supportive and nurturing ethos of the school. St Gregory's will continue to host Open Days and Networking days throughout the year to share our good practice with other schools.

St Gregory's Eco Committee Update

Our main topics of focus this academic year are Marine, Healthy Living, Energy and Transport (led by our Year 8 Travel Ambassadors). As well as encouraging staff and pupils to turn down heating in classrooms and switch off lights, we have undertaken a number of projects.

We organised a raffle for the Rotary Club's Purple for Polio Campaign, which aims to eradicate Polio from the world. We raised £80 for this appeal, which will be tripled in value by the Melinda Gates Foundation.

On 29th November the Brent Schools Climate Champion, Charlotte Milner, came to talk to us about our environmental activities. Ms Milner will use examples of our activities in a best practice framework she is compiling for all schools in Brent.

In December, four members of our school Eco Committee represented St Gregory's at Brent Council's first Climate Showcase Event, held at Brent Civic Centre.

On 1st February, the Year 9 Eco Committee joined forces with pupils from Uxendon Manor Primary School to participate in a community event in Woodcock Park which was part of a project to (hopefully) introduce beavers to the brook running through the park. We received a highly informative talk by beaver expert, Derek Gow, on the history of beavers and their importance in maintaining the ecology and biodiversity of our landscapes. We also planted a variety of plants around the brook which will help improve the biodiversity of this area.

On 7th February the Year 9 Eco Committee gave assemblies to all pupils at St Bernadette's Catholic Primary School in support of their sustainability week. We showed pupils how to recycle properly and we gave them lots of tips to help them live more sustainably in their daily lives.

One thing you can start doing now to support St Gregory's Sustainability Month in March is to start collecting up your used batteries. We will be doing a collection in school as part of our recycling initiatives. St Gregory's Eco Committee

The survey results told us pupils believe it is important to tackle air pollution, traffic congestion and road safety. As a result, the Travel Ambassadors are leading a petition to ask Brent Council to install pelican crossings on all road crossings at the junction of Kenton Road/Woodcock Hill/Kenton Lane. Science Lecture at Harrow School

On Tuesday 30th January some pupils from years 10 and 11 attended a lecture at Harrow School entitled, Why do we need science and art? It was led by Professor Kneebone, Head of Anatomy at Imperial College London. He first talked about his experience as a trauma surgeon, where he dealt mainly with stab wounds and how this inspired him to start the SHARP project. This programme aims to reduce knife crime by educating teenagers on what happens after a stabbing, particularly in surgery and the consequences of it. His talk also discussed how art and science work closely together and how many of the skills used in craftsmanship, art and textiles align closely with those in surgery. At the end we had the opportunity to take part in a mock surgery where we were able to see and feel all the instruments used and the importance of teamwork during an operation. Overall it was a very educational and fun trip.
